

## LITTLE STAMMERHAM FARM, Two Mile Ash



The front part of this L-shaped house dates from the 17<sup>th</sup> century, or possibly earlier, and the back from the early 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The 1608 Inquisitions Post Mortem (IPM) of Richard Lintott listed many of the lands which eventually descended to Bernard Lintot, the famous publisher. (See LINTOT, BARNABY BERNARD). In the IPM, "Lintott's lands" were identified as being "in Stammerham", and this is the main indication that Little Stammerham was the Lintott's original home. Sir Henry Fletcher married Bernard Lintot's grand-daughter, Catherine, the heiress to the Lintott estates in Horsham and Southwater, and therefore, by 1805, Little Stammerham was owned by Sir Henry Fletcher and occupied by James Bax who paid £ 20 15s 0d rent and £ 4 3s 0d tax. In 1912 it was occupied by James Spencer.
